## **TOPIC:** Introduction to Computer Hardware and GSM Repairs A. MEANING OF KEY TERMS

**Computer Hardware** Computer hardware refers to the physical, tangible parts of a computer system that you can see and touch. These include:

Monitor

Keyboard

Mouse

System unit (CPU)

Printer

Scanner

**Computer Hardware Repair** This is the process of identifying, diagnosing, and fixing problems or faults in the physical components of a computer system. It involves:

Testing faulty components

Replacing damaged parts

Maintaining computer systems

**GSM** (**Global System for Mobile Communications**) GSM is a digital mobile network technology used worldwide for mobile communication. It allows users to make calls, send text messages, and use data services on mobile phones.

**GSM Repairs** This refers to the process of identifying and fixing hardware or software faults in mobile phones (GSM devices). It includes:

Screen replacement

Battery replacement

Charging port repairs

Software troubleshooting

Network problems solving

#### B. SCOPE OF COMPUTER HARDWARE AND GSM REPAIRS

The field of computer hardware and GSM repairs covers the following areas:

### 1. Computer Hardware Repairs:

- Diagnosis of computer problems
- Replacement of faulty parts (motherboard, RAM, hard drive, etc.)

- Accessory repairs (earphones, chargers)

#### **TOPIC:** History of Computers

## A. PRE-COMPUTER ERA (Early Computing Devices)

**Abacus (3000 BC)** 

Still used in some Asian countries today

#### Napier's Bones (1617)

• Invented by John Napier (Scottish mathematician)

Used for multiplication and division

Made of rods with numbers inscribed

#### **Slide Rule (1622)**

Invented by William Oughtred

Used for multiplication, division, and trigonometry

Popular until the 1970s

### Pascal's Calculator/Pascaline (1642)

Invented by Blaise Pascal (French mathematician)

First mechanical calculator

Used for addition and subtraction

#### Leibniz Calculator (1673)

Invented by Gottfried Wilhelm Leibniz

Improved on Pascal's calculator

Could perform multiplication and division

### Jacquard's Loom (1801)

Invented by Joseph Marie Jacquard

Used punched cards to control weaving patterns

Inspired early computer programming

## **Charles Babbage's Machines**

Difference Engine (1822) - mechanical calculator

Analytical Engine (1837) - first general-purpose computer design

Charles Babbage is called "Father of Computers"

## Herman Hollerith's Tabulating Machine (1890)

Used punched cards for data processing

Used in 1890 US Census

Reduced census processing time from 8 years to 6 months

#### **B. GENERATIONS OF COMPUTERS**

### FIRST GENERATION (1940-1956) - Vacuum Tubes

#### **Characteristics:**

Used vacuum tubes for circuitry

Used magnetic drums for memory

Very large in size (room-sized)

Generated much heat

Consumed lots of electricity

Very expensive

Unreliable and frequent failures

Slow in operation

Used machine language (0s and 1s)

## **Examples:**

ENIAC (Electronic Numerical Integrator and Computer) - 1946

EDVAC (Electronic Discrete Variable Automatic Computer) - 1952

UNIVAC (Universal Automatic Computer) - 1951

IBM (International Business Machine) 701 - 1953

## **SECOND GENERATION (1956-1963) - Transistors**

#### **Characteristics:**

Used transistors instead of vacuum tubes

Smaller in size than first generation

Generated less heat

More reliable

Faster processing speed

Used assembly language and high-level languages (FORTRAN, COBOL)

Less expensive than first generation

Still required air conditioning

#### **Examples:**

IBM 1401

**IBM** 7094

CDC 1604

UNIVAC 1108

## THIRD GENERATION (1964-1971) - Integrated Circuits (ICs)

#### **Characteristics:**

Used Integrated Circuits (ICs)

Much smaller in size

More reliable and efficient

Generated less heat

Faster processing speed

Used high-level languages (BASIC, Pascal)

Keyboards and monitors introduced

Operating systems developed

More affordable

### **Examples:**

IBM 360 series

IBM 370 series

PDP-8

PDP-11

## FOURTH GENERATION (1971-Present) -

## **Microprocessors Characteristics:**

Uses microprocessors (complete CPU on a single chip)

Very small in size (laptops, tablets, smartphones)

Very fast processing speed

Highly reliable

Generates minimal heat

Very affordable

Portable and user-friendly

Uses high-level languages and GUIs

Internet connectivity

### **Examples:**

Personal Computers (PCs)

**Tablets** 

Smartphones

IBM PC (1981)

Apple Macintosh (1984)

Dell, HP, Lenovo computers

#### **Key Invention:**

Intel 4004 (first microprocessor) - 1971

## FIFTH GENERATION (Present and Future) - Artificial Intelligence

#### **Characteristics:**

Based on Artificial Intelligence (AI)

Uses parallel processing

Voice recognition

Natural language understanding

Machine learning

Quantum computing (developing)

Ultra-fast processing

Advanced robotics

#### **Examples:**

AI assistants (Siri, Alexa, Google Assistant)

Self-driving cars

Advanced robotics

Quantum computers (in development)

Neural networks and deep learning systems

#### C. HISTORY OF GSM TECHNOLOGY

#### **Global Development:**

## **Early Mobile Communications (1940s-1970s)**

1946: First mobile telephone service in USA

1973: First handheld mobile phone call by Martin Cooper (Motorola)

Phone weighed 2kg!

## Birth of GSM (1980s)

1982: GSM project started in Europe

GSM stands for "Groupe Spécial Mobile" (later "Global System for Mobile

Communications")

1987: GSM standards agreed upon

1991: First GSM call made in Finland

### **Mobile Network Generations:**

#### 1G (First Generation) - 1980s

- Analog technology
- Voice calls only
- Poor quality and security
- Large mobile phones

## 2G (Second Generation) - 1991

- Digital technology (GSM introduced)
- SMS (text messaging) introduced
- Better voice quality
- Data services (GPRS, EDGE)
- Smaller phones

### 3G (Third Generation) - 2001

High-speed mobile data

Video calling

Mobile internet

Multimedia messaging (MMS)

Smartphones emerged

## 4G (Fourth Generation) - 2009

Very high-speed internet

HD video streaming

Online gaming

Cloud services

IP telephony (VoIP)

## 5G (Fifth Generation) - 2019

Ultra-fast speeds

Low latency

IoT (Internet of Things) support

Smart cities

Enhanced mobile experiences

#### D. HISTORY OF GSM TECHNOLOGY IN NIGERIA

## Timeline of Mobile Telecommunications in Nigeria:

### 1. Pre-GSM Era (Before 2001)

1992: NITEL (Nigerian Telecommunications Limited) introduced mobile services

Very expensive and limited coverage

Poor service quality

Few subscribers (mainly businesses and wealthy individuals)

## **GSM Era Begins (2001)**

**August 2001:** Nigerian Communications Commission (NCC) licensed four GSM operators:

MTN Nigeria (launched August 2001) - first to launch

Econet Wireless (now Airtel) - launched August 2001

Globacom (Glo) - launched August 2003

Etisalat (now 9mobile) - launched 2008

#### **Key Milestones:**

#### 2001:

MTN and Econet launched GSM services

 Initial subscription cost: N20,000 for SIM card Limited coverage (Lagos, Abuja, Port Harcourt)

## 2003:

Globacom entered the market

Per-second billing introduced (revolutionary!)

SIM card prices dropped significantly

• Competition increased

#### 2008:

Etisalat (now 9mobile) launched

3G services introduced

Mobile internet became popular

Blackberry phones gained popularity

#### 2013-2014:

4G LTE services launched

Smartphones became affordable

Social media usage exploded

Mobile money services introduced

#### 2019-Present:

NCC approved 5G spectrum auction

MTN and Mafab won 5G licenses (2021)

5G services launched in Nigeria (2022)

Over 200 million mobile subscribers in Nigeria

#### **Impact on Nigeria:**

**Economic:** Created millions of jobs (technicians, vendors, call centers)

Social: Improved communication nationwide

**Educational:** Enabled e-learning and online education **Business:** Facilitated mobile banking, e-commerce

Entrepreneurship: Created repair business opportunities

## **GSM Repair Industry in Nigeria:**

Emerged shortly after GSM introduction (2001)

Initially dominated by foreign technicians

Nigerian technicians trained through apprenticeship

Growth of phone repair markets (Computer Village, Lagos; Wuse Market, Abuja)

Training centers established Spare parts importation business boomed

#### A. CLASSIFICATION BY SIZE AND PROCESSING POWER

### 1. MICROCOMPUTERS (Personal Computers)

**Definition:** Microcomputers are small, single-user computers designed for personal or office use. They use microprocessors as their Central Processing Unit (CPU).

## **Characteristics:**

Smallest in size

Designed for single user

Least expensive

Moderate processing speed

Portable or desktop

Uses microprocessor chip

Easy to use

Widely available

### **Types of Microcomputers:**

#### a) Desktop Computers

- Designed to fit on a desk
- Separate monitor, keyboard, mouse, system unit Not portable
- More powerful than laptops
- Cheaper than laptops with similar specs
- Easy to upgrade components

## b) Laptop Computers (Notebooks)

- Portable computers
- Built-in screen, keyboard, touchpad
- Battery-powered
- Can work without electricity
- More expensive than desktops
- Slightly less powerful than desktops
- Perfect for students and travelers

#### c) Tablets

- Touchscreen devices
- Very portable
- Smaller than laptops
- Runs mobile operating systems (Android, iOS)
- Good for reading, browsing, basic tasks
- Examples: iPad, Samsung Galaxy Tab

#### d) Smartphones

- Pocket-sized computers
- Combines phone with computer functions
- Touchscreen interface
- Internet connectivity
- Multiple sensors (camera, GPS, gyroscope)
- Examples: iPhone, Samsung Galaxy, Tecno

### e) Wearable Computers

- Worn on the body
- Very small
- Examples: Smartwatches (Apple Watch), Fitness trackers

- Lenovo ThinkPad
- Acer Aspire

## **Uses of Microcomputers:**

Home use (entertainment, personal tasks)

Office work (word processing, spreadsheets)

Education (e-learning, research)

Gaming

Web browsing and social media

Graphic design and video editing

Programming and software development Small business operations

## **MINICOMPUTERS** (Midrange Computers)

**Definition:** Minicomputers are medium-sized, multi-user computers designed for small to medium organizations. They are more powerful than microcomputers but less powerful than mainframes.

#### **Characteristics:**

- Medium size (size of a refrigerator)
- Supports multiple users (10-200 users simultaneously)
- More expensive than microcomputers
- Higher processing speed
- Requires controlled environment (air conditioning)
- Needs technical personnel to operate
- More reliable than microcomputers

## **Examples of Minicomputers:**

- IBM AS/400
- HP 3000
- DEC PDP-11
- Sun SPARC Enterprise

#### **Uses of Minicomputers:**

Departmental computing in universities

Small to medium business operations

Bank branch operations

Manufacturing process control

Scientific research

Hospital management systems

Inventory management

Regional office operations

#### MAINFRAME COMPUTERS

**Definition:** Mainframe computers are large, powerful, multi-user computers designed to process huge amounts of data at very high speeds. They serve as central data repositories for large organizations.

#### **Characteristics:**

Very large in size (room-sized)

Very expensive (millions of dollars)

Supports thousands of users simultaneously

Extremely fast processing speed

Very high storage capacity (terabytes to petabytes)

High reliability (99.999% uptime)

Requires special environment (temperature controlled, raised floors)

Needs specialized technical staff

Can run multiple operating systems simultaneously

Excellent security features

#### **SUPERCOMPUTERS**

**Definition:** Supercomputers are the most powerful, fastest, and most expensive computers. They are designed to solve extremely complex problems that require massive calculations.

#### **Characteristics:**

Largest and most powerful

Extremely expensive (tens to hundreds of millions of dollars)

Fastest processing speed (measured in petaflops or exaflops)

Massive storage capacity

Uses parallel processing (multiple processors working together)

Requires huge power supply

Needs extensive cooling systems

Specially designed rooms with controlled environment

Used for very specialized tasks

Operated by highly trained specialists

## CLASSIFICATION BY PURPOSE GENERAL PURPOSE COMPUTERS

Designed to perform variety of tasks

Can run different types of programs

Examples: Personal computers, laptops

Uses: Office work, entertainment, education

## **SPECIAL PURPOSE COMPUTERS (Dedicated Computers)**

Designed for specific tasks only

Cannot easily be reprogrammed for other tasks

More efficient at their specific task

#### Examples:

- o **ATM machines** (banking transactions only)
- **o** Traffic light controllers
- Washing machine controllers
- o **Calculator** (calculations only)
- Video game consoles (gaming)
- o Medical diagnostic machines (CT scan, MRI)
- **o** Weather monitoring stations

## C. CLASSIFICATION BY FUNCTIONALITY/DATA HANDLING 1. ANALOG COMPUTERS

- Process continuous data (temperature, pressure, speed)
- Measure physical quantities
- Less accurate
- Examples: Speedometer, thermometer, voltmeter
- Uses: Scientific experiments, industrial process control

### 2. DIGITAL COMPUTERS

- Process discrete data (0s and 1s)
- Operate on binary system
- Very accurate
- Most common type
- Examples: Calculators, PCs, smartphones
- Uses: All modern computing applications

#### 3. HYBRID COMPUTERS

- Combination of analog and digital
- · Accept both continuous and discrete data
- Examples: Hospital ICU monitors, fuel pumps with digital displays
- Uses: Medical diagnostics, industrial control, aviation

## **TOPIC: Basic Computer Hardware Components**

A computer system consists of four main functional units:

**Input Unit** 

**Processing Unit (CPU)** 

**Storage Unit (Memory)** 

#### A. COMPUTER SYSTEM ORGANIZATION

A computer system works like a factory:

- INPUT → PROCESSING → OUTPUT
  - With STORAGE supporting all operations

#### **Simple Illustration:**

#### **B. INPUT UNIT/DEVICES**

**Definition:** Input devices are hardware components used to enter data and instructions into the computer system. They convert human-readable data into machine-readable form (binary code: 0s and 1s).

## **Functions of Input Devices:**

Accept data from users

Convert data to digital signals

Send data to processing unit

Enable communication with computer

### **Types of Input Devices:**

## **Keyboard**

Most common input device

Contains letters, numbers, symbols, and function keys

Types: Standard (QWERTY), Ergonomic, Wireless

Used for: Typing text, entering commands

#### Mouse

Pointing device

Controls cursor on screen

Types: Wired, Wireless, Optical, Trackball Functions: Clicking, scrolling, dragging Parts: Left button, right button, scroll wheel

#### Scanner

Converts physical documents/images to digital format

Types: Flatbed, Sheet-fed, Handheld Uses: Digitizing documents, photos Output: Digital image files (PDF, JPEG)

### **Digital Camera**

Captures photos and videos digitally Stores images on memory cards

Can transfer to computer via USB/WiFi Uses: Photography, video recording

## **Microphone**

Converts sound to digital audio

Used for: Voice recording, video calls, voice commands

Types: Dynamic, Condenser, USB

### 6. Webcam

Camera for video capture and streaming

Used for: Video calls, live streaming, recording

Can be built-in or external

## **Joystick**

Gaming input device

Controls movement in games

Used in: Gaming, flight simulators

#### **Light Pen**

Pen-shaped pointing device

Used on touchscreens

Applications: Graphic design, signatures

## **Touch Screen**

Input through touching the screen

Found in: Smartphones, tablets, ATMs, kiosks

Types: Resistive, Capacitive

## **Barcode Reader**

Reads barcodes on products

Converts barcode to digital data

Used in: Supermarkets, libraries, warehouses

#### **Biometric Devices**

Fingerprint scanner

Face recognition camera

Retina scanner

Used for: Security, attendance, authentication

#### **Graphics Tablet**

Drawing input device

Used by: Digital artists, graphic designers

Comes with stylus pen Example: Wacom tablet

## Trackpad (Touchpad)

Built into laptops Alternative to mouse Touch-sensitive surface

Supports gestures (pinch, zoom, swipe)

#### **Voice Recognition Systems**

Accept voice commands

Examples: Siri, Google Assistant, Alexa Uses: Voice typing, smart home control

#### Card Reader

Reads data from cards (credit cards, ID cards)

Types: Magnetic stripe, Smart card, SD card readers

Used in: Banks, security systems

## **C. PROCESSING UNIT (CPU - Central Processing Unit)**

**Definition:** The CPU is the "brain" of the computer. It processes all data and instructions, performs calculations, and controls all other components.

## **Components of CPU:**

#### 1. Control Unit (CU)

Controls and coordinates all computer operations

Directs flow of data between components

Interprets instructions

Manages timing of operations

#### **Arithmetic and Logic Unit (ALU)**

Performs all arithmetic operations  $(+, -, \times, \div)$ 

Performs logical operations (AND, OR, NOT)

Compares data

Makes decisions

#### **Registers**

Temporary storage within CPU

Fastest memory in computer

Stores data being processed

Very small capacity (bytes)

Types: Accumulator, Program Counter, Instruction Register

#### **How CPU Works:**

**FETCH:** Gets instruction from memory **DECODE:** Interprets the instruction **EXECUTE:** Performs the instruction

**STORE:** Saves the result

#### **CPU Characteristics:**

**Clock Speed:** Measured in GHz (Gigahertz)

Example: 3.2 GHz = 3.2 billion operations per second

**Cores:** Modern CPUs have multiple cores

Dual-core (2 cores)

Quad-core (4 cores)

o Octa-core (8 cores)

Cache Memory: Small, fast memory inside CPU

### **Examples of CPU Manufacturers:**

Intel (Core i3, i5, i7, i9)

AMD (Ryzen series)

Apple (M1, M2 chips)

Qualcomm (Snapdragon - for phones)

MediaTek (for phones)

#### D. OUTPUT UNIT/DEVICES

**Definition:** Output devices are hardware components that receive processed data from the computer and convert it into human-readable form (text, images, sound, video).

## **Functions of Output Devices:**

Receive processed data from CPU

Convert digital signals to human-readable form

Present information to users

Provide feedback

## **Types of Output Devices:**

#### 1. Monitor (Visual Display Unit - VDU)

Displays text, images, videos

Types:

**CRT (Cathode Ray Tube)** - old, bulky, heavy

LCD (Liquid Crystal Display) - thin, lightweight

o LED (Light Emitting Diode) - energy efficient o

**OLED** - better colors, used in smartphones

Sizes: 14", 17", 19", 21", 24", 27", etc.

Resolution: 720p, 1080p (Full HD), 4K, 8K

#### **Printer**

Produces hard copy (paper output)

Types:

## **Impact Printers:**

#### **Dot Matrix Printer**

Uses pins to strike ribbon

Noisy

Low quality

Cheap

Can print carbon copies

#### **Non-Impact Printers:**

#### **Inkjet Printer**

Sprays ink droplets on paper

Good quality color printing

Affordable

Slower than laser

Used in: Homes, small offices

#### **Laser Printer**

Uses laser beam and toner

Very fast High quality Expensive

Used in: Large offices

#### **3D Printer**

Creates three-dimensional objects
Uses plastic, metal, or other materials

Used in: Manufacturing, medicine, architecture

#### **Speakers**

Output sound and audio

Types: Built-in, External, Wireless (Bluetooth) Used for: Music, videos, notifications, gaming

#### Headphones/Earphones

Personal audio output

Types: Wired, Wireless (Bluetooth), In-ear, Over-ear

Used for: Private listening, gaming, calls

## **Projector**

Projects computer display onto large screen

Used in: Classrooms, presentations, conferences, cinemas

Types: LCD, DLP, LED

#### 6. Plotter

Prints large-format graphics

Used for: Engineering drawings, architectural plans, banners

More accurate than regular printers Types: Pen plotter, Inkjet plotter

#### Computer Output Microfilm (COM)

Stores computer output on microfilm

Saves space

Used in: Libraries, archives

#### E. STORAGE UNIT/DEVICES

**Definition:** Storage devices hold data and programs permanently or temporarily. They store data even when the computer is turned off.

#### **Types of Storage:**

#### **PRIMARY STORAGE (Main Memory)**

#### a) RAM (Random Access Memory)

Temporary/volatile memory (loses data when power off)

Stores data currently being used

Very fast access speed

Measured in GB (Gigabytes)

Example: 4GB, 8GB, 16GB, 32GB RAM

Types: DDR3, DDR4, DDR5

#### **ROM** (Read-Only Memory)

Permanent/non-volatile memory

Contains boot-up instructions (BIOS)

Cannot be easily changed

Data remains when power is off

Types: PROM, EPROM, EEPROM

**Cache Memory** 

Very fast temporary memory Located inside or near CPU Stores frequently used data Very small capacity (MB) Levels: L1, L2, L3 cache

## **SECONDARY STORAGE (Auxiliary Storage)**

#### a) Hard Disk Drive (HDD)

Main storage device in computers

Magnetic storage

Large capacity: 500GB - 10TB

Slower than SSD

Mechanical parts (spinning disks)

Cheaper per GB
Can fail mechanically

#### **Solid State Drive (SSD)**

No moving parts

Much faster than HDD

More expensive than HDD

More reliable and durable

Silent operation

Lower capacity for same price Example: 256GB, 512GB, 1TB SSD

### **USB Flash Drive (Pen Drive)**

Portable storage

Connects via USB port

Capacities: 4GB - 512GB

Small and convenient

Affordable

Can be easily lost

## **Memory Cards**

Used in cameras, phones, tablets

Types: SD, MicroSD, CF Capacities: 4GB - 1TB Small and portable

#### **External Hard Drive**

Portable HDD or SSD

Connects via USB

Used for: Backup, extra storage

Capacities: 500GB - 5TB

**CD** (Compact Disc)
Optical storage

Capacity: ~700MB

Types: CD-R (write once), CD-RW (rewritable)

Read by laser

#### Becoming obsolete

## **DVD** (Digital Versatile Disc)

Optical storage

Capacity: 4.7GB (single layer), 8.5GB (dual layer)

Types: DVD-R, DVD-RW Used for: Movies, software

**Blu-ray Disc** 

High-capacity optical disc Capacity: 25GB - 128GB

Used for: HD movies, large data storage

Cloud Storage
Online storage

Access from anywhere with internet

Examples: Google Drive, Dropbox, iCloud, OneDrive

Capacities: 5GB free - unlimited (paid)

Advantages: Accessible anywhere, automatic backup Disadvantages: Requires internet, privacy concerns

#### G. HOW ALL COMPONENTS WORK TOGETHER

#### **Example: Typing and Saving a Document**

INPUT: You type on keyboard

**PROCESSING:** CPU processes the text **OUTPUT:** Text appears on monitor **STORAGE:** You save file to hard disk

## **Step-by-Step Process:**

User types "Hello" on **keyboard** (INPUT) Keyboard sends signal to **CPU** (PROCESSING)

CPU stores in **RAM** temporarily

CPU sends display signal to **monitor** (OUTPUT)

"Hello" appears on screen

User clicks "Save"

CPU transfers data from RAM to hard disk (STORAGE)

#### **TOPIC: Identification and Functions of Hardware Parts**

Now we'll look deeper inside the computer system unit to understand the main components.

#### A. THE MOTHERBOARD (System Board/Mainboard)

**Definition:** The motherboard is the main circuit board of the computer. It connects all hardware components together and allows them to communicate.

## **Description:**

Large green or black printed circuit board

Contains circuits, chips, and slots

• Everything connects to the motherboard

Located inside the system unit

#### **Functions of Motherboard:**

**Central Connection:** Connects all computer components **Power Distribution:** Distributes power to components

Data Transfer: Provides pathways for data flow

Component Housing: Holds CPU, RAM, expansion cards

Communication: Enables communication between components

#### **Major Components on Motherboard:**

#### **CPU Socket**

Where processor (CPU) is installed Types: LGA (Intel), PGA (AMD)

Usually covered by heat sink and fan

#### **RAM Slots (DIMM Slots)**

Slots for RAM modules

Usually 2 or 4 slots

Color-coded for dual-channel configuration

Located near CPU

#### **Expansion Slots**

For adding expansion cards

Types:

PCI (Peripheral Component Interconnect) o

PCIe (PCI Express) - faster, modern

o AGP - old, for graphics cards

Used for: Graphics cards, sound cards, network cards

#### Chipset

Set of chips controlling data flow

Two main chips:

**Northbridge:** Fast components (CPU, RAM, Graphics) • **Southbridge:** Slower components (USB, SATA, Audio)

Modern systems integrate these into CPU

### **BIOS Chip**

Contains Basic Input/Output System Firmware that starts computer Small chip with battery nearby

#### **CMOS Battery**

Small round battery (like watch battery)

**Powers BIOS settings** 

Maintains date/time when computer is off

Typically CR2032 (3V)

#### **Power Connectors**

Main Power (24-pin or 20-pin): Powers motherboard

CPU Power (4-pin or 8-pin): Powers processor

**SATA Power:** Powers drives

#### **SATA Ports**

Connect hard drives and optical drives

Usually 4-8 ports

• Faster than old IDE/PATA

SATA versions: SATA I, II, III (fastest)

#### 9. USB Headers

Internal USB connections

Connect to front panel USB ports

USB 2.0 and USB 3.0 headers

#### **Front Panel Connectors**

Small pins for case connections

Power button

Reset button

LED lights

Hard drive activity light

#### **Back Panel I/O (Input/Output)**

Ports on back of motherboard:

**PS/2 Ports:** Old keyboard/mouse (purple/green)

- o **USB Ports:** USB 2.0, 3.0, 3.1
- o Audio Jacks: Microphone, speakers, line-in/out
- o **Ethernet Port:** Network connection (RJ-45)
- o Video Ports: VGA, DVI, HDMI, DisplayPort

## (CPU/Processor) Physical Description:

Small square chip (about 2-4 cm)

Metal cover with numbers/text

Pins or contacts underneath

Generates heat (needs cooling)

Core i7 (high performance)
Core i9 (enthusiast/professional)

## **Clock Speed**

Measured in GHz (Gigahertz)

Example: 3.6 GHz = 3.6 billion cycles per second

Higher = faster (generally)

#### **Number of Cores**

Single-core: One processing unit

Dual-core: Two cores (2x speed for multi-tasking)

**Quad-core:** Four cores **Hexa-core:** Six cores **Octa-core:** Eight cores

More cores = better multi-tasking

#### **Cache Memory**

L1 Cache: Smallest, fastest (32-64 KB per core) L2 Cache: Medium (256 KB - 1 MB per core)

## **TDP** (Thermal Design Power)

#### **CPU Fan**

Attached to heat sink Blows air through fins Usually 2-pin, 3-pin, or 4-pin connector

#### **Liquid Cooling (Advanced)**

Water cooling system
Better than air cooling
Quieter operation
More expensive

Stores data in memory cells

#### **Types of SSDs:**

## 2.5" SATA SSD:

Looks like laptop HDD

**Uses SATA connection** 

Easy upgrade from HDD

Up to 550 MB/s read speed

#### **M.2 SSD:**

Small stick shape

Plugs directly into motherboard

No cables needed

**SATA M.2:** 550 MB/s (same as 2.5" SATA)

**NVMe M.2:** Up to 7000+ MB/s (very fast!)

#### **PCIe SSD:**

Plugs into PCIe slot

Very fast

Usually NVMe protocol

Expensive

More expensive

## **Advantages of SSD:**

Much faster than HDD (3-20x)

No moving parts (reliable)

Silent operation

Lightweight

Shock resistant

Lower power consumption

Faster boot times

Cooler operation

## **Disadvantages:**

More expensive per GB

• Smaller capacities for same price

Limited write cycles (though very high)

Data recovery harder if fails

#### **Common Uses:**

**SSD:** Operating system, programs (fast access needed)

**HDD:** Documents, photos, videos (bulk storage)

## F. POWER SUPPLY UNIT (PSU)

**Definition:** The power supply converts AC (Alternating Current) from wall outlet to DC (Direct Current) needed by computer components.

#### **Physical Description:**

Metal box (usually at top or bottom of case)

Fan on one side

Multiple cables coming out

Power switch (sometimes)

AC power socket

#### **Functions:**

Converts AC (220V-240V in Nigeria) to DC (3.3V, 5V, 12V)

Distributes power to all components

Protects against power surges

Regulates voltage

#### **Power Connectors:**

#### **24-pin Main Power (20+4)**

Powers motherboard

Largest connector

Sometimes 20-pin on older boards

#### 4-pin/8-pin CPU Power

Powers processor

Usually near CPU socket

#### 4+4 pin design (can split)

## 6-pin/8-pin PCIe Power

Powers graphics card

High-end cards need 1-3 connectors

6+2 pin design

#### **SATA Power**

Flat L-shaped connector

Powers HDDs, SSDs, optical drives

15 pins

## **Molex (4-pin peripheral)**

Old-style connector

Powers old drives, fans

Being phased out

## Berg (Floppy power)

Small 4-pin

For floppy drives

Rare now

## **PSU Specifications:**

#### Wattage:

Power output capacity

Common: 400W, 500W, 600W, 750W, 850W, 1000W+

Must be sufficient for all components

Basic system: 400-500W Gaming system: 600-750W High-end gaming: 850W+

#### G. GRAPHICS PROCESSING UNIT (GPU/Graphics Card)

**Definition:** The GPU processes graphics and video, reducing load on CPU for visual tasks.

## **Types:**

#### 1. Integrated Graphics:

**Built into CPU** 

Shares system RAM

Lower performance

No extra cost

Sufficient for basic tasks

• Examples: Intel UHD, AMD Radeon Vega

## 2. Dedicated/Discrete Graphics:

Separate card

Own RAM (VRAM)

Much more powerful

Required for gaming, video editing, 3D work

Expensive

Requires PSU power connectors

#### **Physical Description:**

Circuit board

Large heat sink and fans

#### **TOPIC: Tools and Equipment for Computer and GSM Repairs**

Professional repair work requires proper tools. Using the right tool makes work easier, faster, and safer.

#### A. BASIC HAND TOOLS

#### 1. Screwdrivers

# Phillips Head Screwdriver:

Cross-shaped (+) tip

Most common in computers and phones

Sizes: #0 (very small), #1 (small), #2 (standard)

Uses: Most computer and phone screws

#### Flat Head Screwdriver:

Single blade (-) tip

Less common in electronics

Various sizes

Uses: Some old computer screws, prying (carefully)

#### **Torx Screwdriver:**

Star-shaped tip

Common in laptops and phones

Sizes: T5, T6, T8, T10, etc.

Uses: Apple devices, modern smartphones, Xbox controllers

#### **Precision Screwdriver Set:**

Very small screwdrivers

Essential for phone repairs

Usually includes: Phillips, Flathead, Torx

Often color-coded

Magnetic tips helpful

#### **Pentalobe Screwdriver:**

Five-pointed star

Used by Apple (iPhone, MacBook)

Sizes: P2, P5, P6

Security screw to prevent easy opening

# Hex/Allen Key:

Hexagonal tip

Less common in electronics Sizes: 1.5mm, 2mm, 2.5mm, etc. Uses: Some laptop and phone parts

# **Important:**

# **Digital Multimeter**

# (DMM) Description:

Essential testing device Measures electrical properties Digital display Various ranges and settings

#### What It Measures:

# **Voltage (V - Volts):**

DC Voltage (DCV): Batteries, power supplies AC Voltage (ACV): Wall outlets (220V in Nigeria)

Uses:

Test battery voltage Check power supply outputs Verify phone charging voltage (5V) Measure laptop adapter output (19V typical)

# **Basic Soldering Iron:**

Fixed temperature (usually 40W-60W) Cheap (₦2,000-₦5,000)

# **Temperature-Controlled Soldering Station:**

Adjustable temperature (200°C-450°C)

### **WEEK 7: Safety Precautions in Computer and GSM Repair Workshops**

Safety in the repair workshop is crucial to protect the technician from injury and the electronic components from damage.

### 1. Electrostatic Discharge (ESD) Protection

**ESD** is the sudden flow of electricity between two electrically charged objects caused by contact, an electrical short, or dielectric breakdown. It is a major risk to delicate electronic components.

#### **Precautions:**

Use a **grounded anti-static mat** on the workbench.

Wear an **anti-static wrist strap** (grounding yourself) before touching any electronic device or component.

Handle components and circuit boards by their edges to avoid touching the contacts or components.

Transport sensitive components in an anti-static container or packaging.

#### **General Workshop Safety**

**Workspace:** Ensure the work surface is **flat and clean**.

**Tools:** Use **professional and good quality tools** dedicated to the repair job. Handle hot tools like **soldering irons and hot air stations** with care to prevent burn risks and damage to phones.

**Power and Cables:** Disconnect equipment from the electrical outlet before cleaning or working inside. Ensure cables are not located where they can be stepped on or tripped over.

**Liquids/Heat:** Keep liquids, food, and heat sources (like radiators) away from equipment. Do not use equipment in a wet environment.

#### **Essential Safety Equipment**

**Fire Extinguisher:** For putting out electrical fires.

First Aid Box: For treating minor injuries.

Protective Gear: Safety goggles/eyewear and gloves are recommended when

disassembling/re-assembling a device.

**Respirators/Nose Guard:** To protect against fumes from soldering.

### **Battery Handling Safety**

**Discharge:** Always fully discharge batteries before working on them.

Damage: DO NOT proceed with repairs if the battery shows signs of damage (e.g.,

leaking, expansion, or folds).

**Abuse:** Do not heat, puncture, mutilate, or drop a lithium-ion battery.

### **WEEK 8: GSM Technology Overview**

### Meaning and Definition

### **GSM** stands for **Global System for Mobile Communications**.

It is a widely accepted family of standards used to describe the protocols for **Second-Generation** (2G) digital cellular networks.

It is a cellular system that uses a combination of **Time Division Multiple Access (TDMA)** and **Frequency Division Multiple Access (FDMA)** to allow multiple users to share the same frequency channel.

### 2. Evolution (Brief History)

The concept emerged in the early 1970s from Bell Laboratories.

The standardization group, **Groupe Spécial Mobile (GSM)**, was established in 1982 by CEPT to create a common Pan-European mobile telephone standard.

The responsibility was later transferred to the European Telecommunications Standards Institute (ETSI) in 1989.

The first commercial GSM services were launched in 1991.

GSM evolved to include **General Packet Radio Service** (GPRS) (packet-switched data) and **Enhanced Data Rates for GSM Evolution** (EDGE) (higher data rates).

#### **Importance and Advantages**

Mobile phones, or GSM devices, contain several small, yet critical, components that work together to enable communication.

Printed Circuit Board (PCB)	Motherboard, Logic Board	The most important part; all integrated circuits (ICs) and other components are fixed onto this board.		
Battery	Power Source	Supplies the necessary <b>DC current (e.g., 3.7V or 3.8V)</b> to the entire mobile phone.		
Screen/Display	Visual Display	The output unit that displays images, text, and videos (can be LCD or TFT). The <b>Touch</b> digitizer sits on top and allows touch input.		
Microphone (Mic)	Mouth Piece	An <b>input device</b> that converts the user's voice/sound into electrical signals to be transmitted.		
Speaker	Earpiece, Receiver	Converts electrical signals back into sound signals, allowing the user to hear the person on a call.		
Ringer	Buzzer, Loud Speaker	Plays loud sound for ringtones, alarms, and music playback.		
Charging Port/Connector	Charging Jack	The socket where an external charger is plugged in to transfer voltage and recharge the battery.		
SIM Card Connector	SIM Socket	Connects the <b>Subscriber Identity Module (SIM)</b> card to the PCB, which is necessary for the phone to make or receive calls.		

# WEEK 10: Practical: Identification and Labeling of Hardware and GSM Parts

## 1. Objective

### **Procedure (Example: Disassembling a Mobile Phone)**
